A word from Rev. Barry Andrews, Senior Pastor

In many areas of our nation the Labor Day weekend sort of marks the end of summer and the advent of fall. Not so here in the Sunshine State, where summer still holds and the peak of hurricane season is yet upon us.

I seem to have a knack for pending news, and today, as this is written, a tropical storm is a-heading our way. We'll batten down the hatches and clear the deck here on the Gospel ship, docked at Spring Park Road, and ride the storm out. As an aside, if you need a port in the storm, call the church, and if your power goes out, and you have a freezer full of steaks,



come down to the church and cook them on our gas range, rather than throwing everything out.

This is indeed a stormy season. Just watch the news and you'll be awash in political ads and news. Our friends and neighbors perhaps have strong opinions, and share them with us, too often in a confronting, bombastic tone. It's a time for name- calling and character demeaning, all in the name of politics. What is a Christian to do?

According to the New Testament, we're to pray for those in authority. It's tough to demean those we pray for and hopefully we'll be convicted, if we're prone to that sort of behavior, to clean up our act and attitude. While we're quick to recognize unpleasant behavior in others, the Gospel is very clear that self- examination, and a spiritual cleansing, is most often the best option for a disciple of Jesus Christ.

We live in a grand land, and politicking is just part of the formula. With a sense of history, the tenor is all about the same; it's just the medium that's evolved. It seems to be our nature to call names and sling mud, but we, as Christians, should take a higher road. This is, indeed, one of those chances we have to be the city on the hill, and I hope we make it our own, not just for this stormy season, but as a rule and way of life.

Opportunities to help Louisiana flood victims

Over 60,000 homes have been damaged by the disastrous flooding in Louisiana, and Florida Conference church members can help the families in distress.

Bishop Carter invites you to please consider giving a special offering this Sunday to help those affected by the floods in Louisiana. Please write "Louisiana Flood Relief" on your envelope. All money received will be given directly to the Louisiana Conference, enabling them to use the money when and where it is needed most.

The Conference also invites churches and members to package cleaning bucket kits to be shipped to the UMCOR Sager Brown Depot in Baldwin, Louisiana. The director there reports that as fast as kits are coming in, they are going back out to help those affected by the floods. We also need to replenish the kits for the balance of the hurricane season. I challenge individuals/groups to do this.

The 5-gallon buckets are to be cleaning bucket kits are filled with laundry detergent, household cleaners, dish soap, air freshener, insect repellant, scrub brush, cleaning wipes, sponges, scouring pads, clothespins, clothesline, trash bags, dust masks, dishwashing gloves, and work gloves. 












Crossword Puzzle: Who Said That?

Elderly Urinary Tract Infections: Symptoms & Care

I have noticed that several of our older members have had problems (some quite serious) with urinary tract infections (UTI). For that reason I feel that the following information may be helpful for those in our congregation, whether for ourselves or those we care for.

In an older person a UTI does not always cause pain or discomfort when urinating. A sudden change in behavior is, in fact, one of the best indicators in older adults. Some common warning signs might include the onset of urinary incontinence, confusion, or not being able to do tasks the person could easily do a day or two before. Symptoms of a UTI include general discomfort, a feeling of being overtired, blood in the urine, and/or pain even when not urinating. Men might feel fullness in the rectum. Back and side pain can indicate the infection has reached the kidneys. An elderly person will rarely get a fever, but if an older person has one it shouldn't be taken lightly.¹

UTIs are also more likely to affect people who attempt to manage stress incontinence by limiting their water intake. They might limit the water they drink so they don't have to go to the bathroom so much, but it puts them at higher risk because there's a greater chance of bacteria build up... You want to keep your urine clear." 1

People suffering from a UTI must drink plenty of fluids to flush the bacteria from their systems. Proper fluid intake makes it harder for bacteria to live and multiply in the urinary tract. It is recommended that older adults drink four to six 8-ounce glasses of water a day. Drinking cranberry juice or taking cranberry tablets can also make urine less inviting for bacteria.²

Drinking plenty of water is an important prevention tactic. Some other methods for women include: urinating promptly after the urge arises, wiping front to back, and taking showers instead of baths.

The main way we support the ministries of the United Methodist Church is through our apportioned funds, a method of giving that proportionally allocates the church-wide budget to conferences and local churches.

Together, through our connected congregations, we accomplish what no single church, district or annual conference ever could hope to do alone. In this way, each individual, each family, each congregation gives a fair share for the church's work. We combine our prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness to make a significant difference in the lives of God's people.

The general funds paid through our apportionments include:

World Service Fund underwrites our global outreach ministry around the world. World Service empowers the United Methodist evangelistic missions by stimulating Bible study and spiritual commitment, encouraging church growth and discipleship, and helping God's children everywhere.

Ministerial Education Fund helps those called to answer the divine call of ministry. United Methodist seminaries lead the effort to proclaim God's word in a world desperately in need of that message.

Episcopal Fund Pays bishops' salaries, covers their office and travel expenses, and provides their pension and health-benefit coverage so our elected and consecrated bishops can oversee and promote the church's spiritual and temporal interests.

Black College Fund allows The United Methodist Church to support the 11 U.S. historically Black colleges and universities. Their graduates—teachers and doctors, ministers and bishops, judges, artists and entrepreneurs—are leaders in the African-American community and in the United States.

Interdenominational Cooperation Fund works in partnership with ecumenical organizations to bear witness to a common Christian faith. We United Methodists acknowledge that we are but a small part of the worldwide Christian church—the living body of Jesus Christ. Our unity with other Christian communions is affirmed as we witness to a common Christian faith, meet human suffering and advocate for peace and justice all over the world.

Africa University Fund supports the only United Methodist-related, degree-granting university on the continent of Africa—serving students from 21 countries, all across the continent of Africa. Africa University provides higher education of excellent quality, enriched with Christian values, for both men and women, developing visionary leaders of tomorrow.

General Administration Fund underwrites and finances general church activities that are administrative in nature — like General Conference, the legislative branch of the church. General Council on Finance and Administration coordinates and administers the finances of the church, receives, disburses and accounts for the church's general funds, safeguards the denomination's legal interests and rights, compiles and publishes denominational statistics and maintains church records.
