On October 2nd, Pastor Rigo Felico mentioned in his sermon that John Wesley asked himself questions daily to make sure that he was spiritually accountable. Inquiring minds needed to know more!

In 1729, while John Wesley was a student at Oxford, he started a club with his brother Charles. It was soon mockingly dubbed "The Holy Club" by some of his fellow collegians. The club members rigorously selfexamined themselves everyday by asking the following 22 questions:

- 1. Am I consciously or unconsciously creating the impression that I am better than I really am? In other words, am I a hypocrite?
- 2. Am I honest in all my acts and words, or do I exaggerate?
- 3. Do I confidentially pass on to others what has been said to me in confidence?
- 4. Can I be trusted?
- 5. Am I a slave to dress, friends, work or habits?
- 6. Am I self-conscious, self-pitying, or self-justifying?
- 7. Did the Bible live in me today?
- 8. Do I give the Bible time to speak to me every day?
- 9. Am I enjoying prayer?
- 10. When did I last speak to someone else of my faith?
- 11. Do I pray about the money I spend?
- 12. Do I get to bed on time and get up on time?
- 13. Do I disobey God in anything?
- 14. Do I insist upon doing something about which my conscience is uneasy?
- 15. Am I defeated in any part of my life?
- 16. Am I jealous, impure, critical, irritable, touchy or distrustful?
- 17. How do I spend my spare time?
- 18. Am I proud?
- 19. Do I thank God that I am not as other people, especially as the Pharisees who despised the publican (a.k.a. tax collector)?
- 20. Is there anyone whom I fear, dislike, disown, criticize, hold a resentment toward or disregard? If so, what am I doing about it?
- 21. Do I grumble or complain constantly?
- 22. Is Christ real to me?

Let's join "The Holy Club" and see how asking these questions of ourselves can change our lives!

- Pastor Appreciation: Several of my preacher buddies note that their churches do very little, or, sometimes, nothing at all, during this month when congregations express, in tangible acts of kindness, appreciation for their pastors. Faith has been very kind to Pastor Rigo and me over the years, and we are thankful. Again, it shows a broad Spirit at work amongst us.
- Providence: I am struck at how close we came to extreme disaster with Hurricane Matthew. Having lived through a few hurricanes, both inland and on the coast, I have some appreciation just how quickly, and badly, things can go wrong in a building storm. God was good to us, and many others, as the storm came up the coast, and we were, for the larger part, spared. Thank you Lord for your providential care.
- Church Family: Last, but not of the least significance, is the blessing of this body of Christ. Through life and death, high and low, strength and weakness, we move on, together. It is certainly God's Holy Spirit at work, and it only really works when we surrender our lives to his control. What a blessings it is, then, when we can share life together.



No matter whom you vote for or who wins, we can be proud to know that: *Many U.S. presidents have Methodist ties.*

- James K. Polk (1845-49) had a conversion experience at a Methodist camp and considered himself a Methodist, though he continued to attend Presbyterian services out of respect to his mother and his wife. Shortly before his death, Polk was baptized and confirmed into the Methodist church by the Rev. John B. McFerrin, the same pastor who was present at his conversion years before.
- Even Abraham Lincoln (1861-65), who frequently spoke of Christian principles but had no specific church ties, was touched by Methodism. His parents were married by a Methodist minister in Washington County, Ky. Later, at Lincoln's White House, a frequent visitor was Methodist Bishop Matthew Simpson. After Lincoln's assassination in 1865, Simpson traveled with the president's body back to Springfield, Ill., and delivered the eulogy. In 1864, shortly before his death, Lincoln offered this praise for the young denomination:

"It is no fault in others that the Methodist Church sends more soldiers to the field, more nurses to the hospitals, and more prayers to Heaven than any. God bless the Methodist Church. Bless all the churches and blessed be God, who in this our trial, giveth us the churches."

- While in the White House, Andrew Johnson (1865-69) accompanied his wife, Eliza, to services at Foundry Church.
- Although never baptized into any church, Ulysses S. Grant (1869-77) regularly attended services at Metropolitan Memorial Methodist Church in Washington, D.C. "Grant was very sympathetic with the Methodists," said Patterson, noting Grant was friends with Methodist Bishop John P. Newman, who was present when Grant died of cancer in 1885.
- Rutherford B. Hayes (1877-81) attended Methodist schools and, as president, attended Foundry Church, a Methodist church in Washington, D.C., with his wife, Lucy.
- Methodist, William McKinley (1897-1901), was elected president. Early in life, McKinley had considered the Methodist ministry, but later became a lawyer. He remained active at the Methodist Church of the Savior in Canton, Ohio. He served as Sunday school superintendent and trustee.
- While in the White House, Bill Clinton (1993-2001), a Southern Baptist, accompanied his wife, Hillary, a lifelong Methodist, to services at Foundry Church.
- George W. Bush (2001-09) entered the office as the nation's first United Methodist president. Raised in Presbyterian and Episcopal churches, Bush became a United Methodist after marrying his wife, Laura, a lifelong Methodist, in 1977. Both attended and taught Sunday school at Highland Park United Methodist Church in Dallas. After he was elected governor of Texas in 1994, Bush worshipped at the Tarrytown United Methodist Church in Austin. Today, his presidential library is on the Dallas campus of Southern Methodist University, the alma mater of his wife.


Lesser Known People in the Bible Mix and Match

How to Liven Up Your Prayer and Bible Study Time

If the saying to the left is true for you, you're too busy! No one is saying we should not work. The work of the church and the hope of the Christian world require that all of us work. But Jesus says in Matthew 6:25-34, "... seek first his kingdom and his righteousness..." This tells us that our priority should be our relationship with God. For those of us needing a boost in our prayer and Bible reading times, these are some things we can try:

- 1. Make a date with God. Set aside time with God when He will be the only person on your mind. It may be first thing in the morning, in the evening, during lunch breaks, in the car, or time spent waiting. It can be once a day or multiple times a day. Although time alone with God is vital, consider praying and reading the Bible with your family as well. Then put the appointments in your calendar and keep them.
- 2. Find a sacred place. In the book and movie, *The War Room*, we were introduced to the "Prayer Closet". This can be a literal closet, or it can be a place in your home, garden, or anywhere you can be alone with God. It should be away from your phone, TV, computer, chores, or any distractions that can interfere. Find a place where you can keep a Bible; pictures of Jesus, our church, and those you are praying for; Bible commentaries; our church's prayer chain; Biblical maps; notes of things you are lead to pray about; favorite Bible verses; a prayer shawl; and a prayer journal. Fill the space with whatever inspires you to pray and study God's word.



- **3. P.R.A.Y.** Don't view prayer and Bible reading times as just another box to check on a spiritual to-do list. Change your mindset from *having to* spend time with God, toward *getting to* spend time with Him.
 - There is no right way to pray, as there is no right way to have a conversation with your best friend. Experiment with fresh ways to connect with God. Enjoy it. Know that God loves you dearly and wants to spend time with you and to hear everything about your life. If you don't know what to say, try using one of the acronyms below. Spend time on each letter (i.e. <u>Praise</u>, <u>Repent</u>, <u>Ask</u>, <u>Yield</u>). Pray for yourself, others, our church, our children, and our land. Pray for whatever is on your heart.
 - For Bible study, consider Bible reading plans, daily devotions, or opening the Bible randomly to see what God puts in front of you. Ask who, what, when, where, how, and why to broaden your study.
- 4. Change it up. It is amazing how changing your position can change your focus. If you normally sit when praying and reading the Bible, try standing, kneeling, bowing, or lying prostrate. Pray with uplifted hands. Bow your head or lift your face to heaven. All are acceptable ways to be with God.
- 5. Be quiet and hear God's voice. Listen for the things that God wants to reveal to you through dedicated prayer and Bible study --- insights into your life, relationships, and understanding God's purposes. *Shhh!*
- 6. Keep the conversation going. Short prayers throughout the day are a great way to increase your prayer life. If you only have ten minutes, set a timer so you don't have to look at a clock. Setting aside more time for prayer will change every other part of our day. The same goes for reading the Bible.
- 7. Make prayer and Bible study a priority. Those hoping to find time for prayer and Bible study will likely fail. You have to make time. These spiritual disciplines take time, effort, and energy. "No discipline seems pleasant at the time, but painful. Later on, however, it produces a harvest of righteousness and peace for those who have been trained by it." Hebrews 12:11. "I like to compare it to exercise," said Jan Reed. "We need exercise to keep our bodies healthy. We need prayer (& Bible study) to keep our souls healthy."
