2016 Advent Home Worship By MaryJane Pierce Norton

Advent is the season when we "get ready" to receive God's gift of Jesus. Here are some ways you can prepare yourself and your family for celebrating Jesus' birth:



- Make an Advent wreath. The circle symbolizes God's never-ending love. Green symbolizes life. The four candles represent the four Sundays leading to Christmas. The white candle symbolizes Jesus.
- Make an Advent prayer chain. Write a prayer concern on 24 strips of construction paper and make a chain. Each day, open a strip and pray for that day's prayer concern.
- **Make a family-blessing jar.** Place an empty jar on your dining table. Each day during Advent, write one blessing for which you are thankful on a slip of paper and put it in the jar. On Christmas Day, pour out the blessings, read them, and give thanks to God for the blessings you have enjoyed during Advent.
- Use the Advent Worship Service (below) to worship individually and with your family daily.

First Week of Advent - Hope

Thursday, December 1, 2016: As we get ready to celebrate again the birth of Jesus, we sometimes get very busy. Today, take a ten-minute break. Sit quietly. If it helps you to concentrate, look at your Advent wreath or Christmas tree. Pray, asking God's help to bring quiet and calm to a busy world.

Friday, December 2, 2016: Think about your family. Some may live with you. Others may be far away. Who in your family needs God's hope? Pray for this family member today.

Saturday, December 3, 2016: There are people in our neighborhoods, in our church, and in our community who need to know of God's hope. Select someone to visit today. Visit electronically or by phone or in person. Go as a family or by yourself. Maybe there is someone you always see at the library. Stop by today and talk with that person. Tell the person you visit one way he or she helps you feel hopeful.

Second Week of Advent - Love

Second Sunday of Advent — **December 4, 2016:** Join us in church or see the readings and prayers for the lighting of the second candle on the Advent wreath at http://www.umcdiscipleship.org/resources/2016-advent-home-worship. Read Isaiah 11:1-10. When we think of God's love, we might not always think of the words of the prophets. But when we read this picture of the peaceable kingdom, we are amazed by God's love that allows a child to lead. Who are the people in our world who need the message of God's love? What are our hopes for how people today can receive the message of God's love? How do we help others know God's love? **Monday, December 5, 2016**: Read again Isaiah 11:1-10. Create a poster by drawing pictures of the wondrous things you see in the world around you that God has created. Create your picture of God's kingdom of peace. Give thanks for the world and all the people in the world.

Tuesday, December 6, 2016: Is there someone you know who needs to hear words of God's love? Make or select a card for that person and mail it today.

Wednesday, December 7, 2016: Love is something we need in our church. Think about the people in our church. Select one person in our church. Pray for that person today.

Thursday, December 8, 2016: As we get ready to celebrate again the birth of Jesus, we sometimes get very busy. Today, take a ten-minute break. Sit quietly. If it helps you to concentrate, look at your Advent wreath or Christmas tree. Pray, asking God's help to bring quiet and calm to a busy world.

Friday, December 9, 2016: Think about your family. Some may live with you. Others may be far away. Who in your family needs God's love? Pray for this family member today.

Saturday, December 10, 2016: There are people in our neighborhoods, in our church, and in our community who need to know of God's love. Select someone to visit today. Visit electronically or by phone or in person. Go as a family or by yourself. Maybe there is someone who waits on you at the grocery store. Stop by today and talk with that person. Tell the person you visit one way he or she makes you feel loved.

Third Week of Advent — Joy

Sunday, December 11, 2016 — 3rd Sunday of Advent: Join us in church or see the readings and prayers for the lighting of the second candle on the Advent wreath at http://www.umcdiscipleship.org/resources/2016-advent-home-worship. Read Luke 1:47-55. How privileged we are to have this beautiful song of Mary. Can you imagine her singing the words written in Scripture? It is a testimony to her faith and joy at being chosen as God's servant. Who needs God's joy? How do we help others know that God gives joy?

Monday, December 12, 2016: Today read again Luke 1:47-55. Make a list together of the things that bring joy to your lives. Write your own song of joy to God or sing a song that expresses joy to God.

Tuesday, December 13, 2016: Is there someone you know who needs to hear words of joy? Make or select a card for that person and mail it today.

Wednesday, December 14, 2016: Joy is something we need in our city. Think about different leaders of our city. Select one leader of our city. Pray for that leader today.

Thursday, December 15, 2016: As we get ready to celebrate again the birth of Jesus, we sometimes get very busy. Today, take a ten-minute break. Sit quietly. If it helps you to concentrate, look at your Advent wreath. Pray, asking God's help to bring quiet and calm to a busy world.

Friday, **December 16**, **2016**. Think about your family. Some may live with you. Others may be far away. Who in your family needs God's joy? Pray for this family member today.

Saturday, December 17, 2016: There are people in our neighborhoods, in our church, and in our community who need to know of God's joy. Select someone to visit today. Visit electronically or by phone or in person. Go as a family or by yourself. Maybe there is someone you see in a place where you go to eat. Stop by today and talk with that person. Tell the person you visit one way he or she brings joy to you.

Fourth Week of Advent — Peace

Sunday, December 18, 2016 — 4th Sunday of Advent: Join us in church or see the readings and prayers for the lighting of the fourth candle on the Advent wreath at http://www.umcdiscipleship.org/resources/2016-advent-home-worship. Read Luke 2:1-20. This Scripture reminds us that when we are fearful, we are often not thinking of peace. The angels calm the shepherds and send them forward with a task. Who are the people in our world who need God's peace? How do we help others know God's desire for peace in our world? **Monday, December 19, 2016:** Peace seems so difficult for us to achieve in our world. Read again Luke 2:1-20. Think about what peace would look like in your family, in your congregation, in your community,

in our nation, and in the world. Pray a prayer of peace asking God for what you have envisioned.

Tuesday, December 20, 2016: Spend time today thinking about your image of a world at peace. Write your thoughts, or create a picture depicting God's peace in the world.

Wednesday December 21, 2016: Today, try a new greeting to those you see in your home, or at work, or as you shop. Say, "Christmas Peace to you." At the end of the day, when you pray, thank God for each person you saw this day and pray that each person will experience the peace of God.

Thursday, December 22, 2016: As we get ready to celebrate again the birth of Jesus, we sometimes get very busy. Today, take a ten-minute break. Sit quietly. If it helps you to concentrate, look at your Advent wreath or Christmas tree. Pray, asking God's help to bring quiet and calm to a busy world.

Friday, December 23, 2016: Take time to do an act of service today for someone in your home or someone in your community. You might want to make cookies for your mail carrier or take a Christmas card to your neighborhood bank. Perhaps you can call those who work at your church and offer thanks for their service. How does showing we appreciate the service of others bring peace? What acts of peace can you do this day? **Saturday, December 24, 2016 -- Christmas Eve:** Light the four candles on your wreath. Read together Matthew 1:18-25. We sometimes forget about Joseph. Are there those in your home or community that you might be forgetting? Pray for the forgotten people in your home, your church, or your community.

Jesus' Birthday

Sunday, December 25, 2016—Christmas Day: Join us in church or see the readings and prayers for the lighting of the second candle on the Advent wreath at http://www.umcdiscipleship.org/resources/2016-advent-home-worship. Read Matthew 2:1-12. It's amazing to think of these persistent travelers who were determined to find Jesus. They traveled with hope and faith in the promise that they would find the new king. Who are the people in our world who need to know of God's promises? What are our hopes on this Christmas Day for our world? How can we help people remember God's promises after Christmas Day is over? Name one thing you are willing to do in the days following Christmas that will help you and others remember God's promises.


As we begin this Advent and Christmas season, here are some ideas that you might want to consider within your own faith communities:

- People are more likely this time of year than just about any other time to be open to an invitation to worship. Be thinking about how you can be intentional with invitations to neighbors, friends, family, and co-workers. The value of hospitality is essential in our Christian witness. Be empowered and equipped to extend that same hospitality.
- 2. This can also be a difficult time of year for people. It's hard for people who are grieving a lost loved one. It's challenging for people who face addiction issues. It's rough for people whose families have a hard time being together in healthy ways. Be in ministry with hurting people and open yet another doorway into your faith community.
- 3. People love Christmas music. We only get to hear it this one time of year. We should derive great meaning from it, and appreciate it, too.
- 4. Invite people to attend the Christmas Eve service and to church, a special outreach or missions event in January to help them to plug-in to your faith community.
- 5. Don't underestimate the power of having worship on Christmas Day! People will come. Make it warm, casual, and inviting, and people will join you.

I know how busy this time of year is. Please know I'm praying for you. Thank you for serving Jesus and helping everyone to, once again, encounter the amazing message of His birth! God bless you, and Merry Christmas!



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The Chrismon tree in our church is more than just a Christmas tree. Its ornaments are Chrismons, a contraction for "Christ monograms", and each one depicts a Christian symbol. These handmade ornaments are white with gold decorations of beads, ribbon, sequins, glitter, etc. The white is the liturgical (or Church) color for Christmas and symbolizes that Jesus was pure and perfect. Gold symbolizes His Majesty and Glory. Below are some of the meanings of the Christmons on our tree.

The Cross symbolises that Christians believe Jesus Christ died for everyone on a Cross.

The Irish or Celtic Cross is a normal cross with a circle in the middle to symbolise eternity.

The Eastern Cross is used by many Eastern or Orthodox Churches.

The Anchor Cross reminds Christian's that Jesus is the anchor of their faith.

The Fish is one of the oldest Christian symbols. The letters, from the Greek word for fish (ichthus), stand for Jesus (I), Christ (X), God (Q), Son (Y), Savior (S).

The Chi-Rho looks like a 'P' with an 'X' on top of it. These two letters are the first two letters of the Greek word 'Christos' which means Christ.

The Star of David, sometimes called the Star of Creation, is a symbol that Jesus was a Jew and a descendant of King David.

A Five Pointed Star represents the five wounds of Jesus on the cross.

The Nativity Star is the symbol of the Star of Bethlehem the Wise men followeds.

An Eight Pointed Star represents baptism and regeneration.

The Crown is the symbol that Jesus in King. It shows that Christians believe Jesus is ruler over heaven and the earth.

The Triquerta is the symbol representing the Christian 'Trinity' of God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit.

The Dove is the symbol of peace and the Holy Spirit. It is shown pointing down to represent the Holy Spirit that appeared as a Dove when Jesus was baptised.

The Cup or Chalice is a symbol of the Mass, Eucharist or Communion. It also represents God's forgiveness.

The Angel reminds Christians of the angels who told the shepherds about the birth of Jesus. It can also represent the second coming of Jesus, which the Bible says will start with an Angel blowing a trumpet.

Babe / Manger represents Jesus as a baby at Christmas.

The Lamb is a symbol for Jesus who is sometimes called 'The Lamb of God'.

The Butterfly is a symbol for transformation and the immortal soul.
